ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE: BUILDINGS OF SARAWAK

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The design of buildings and structures in Sarawak are deeply rooted in Sarawak's diverse cultural heritage, historical influences and local environment. Architectural design should prioritize cultural sensitivity, ensuring that new buildings respect and incorporate local traditions and heritage to preserve their unique identity.


The traditional buildings featured in the artwork by Datin Halima Amin, Ts. Noraziah Mohd Razali and Clement anak Jimel are the Rumah Melanau, Rumah Orang Ulu and the Baruk structure. The longhouse, a distinctive traditional structure symbolises Sarawak's rich cultural heritage. These are communal homes that are elongated wooden structures raised on stilts. The Rumah Melanau and Rumah Orang Ulu is designed to house multiple families while the Baruk structure is used as a meeting place where cultural ceremonies are held for this commune.

During the British colonial era, the traders and immigrants from Chinese community moved to Sarawak and established settlements, leaving a significant mark in the region's architectural identity. As highlighted in the artwork by Merrylove G. Albert, this period saw the rise of shophouses, which featured decorative elements and traditional roof designs that blended both local and Chinese influences, adding a distinct dimension to Sarawak's urban environment.

Trade and interaction with Muslim merchants and explorers contributed to the spread of Islam in Sarawak. Today, Islam is the official religion of Malaysia. Hence, the Islamic architecture in Sarawak is prevalent. Emil Elmariz Bin Johny's artwork incorporates a collage of city photographs that prominently feature mosques. Mosques often feature classic Islamic architectural elements such as domes, minarets, and decorative calligraphy. These mosques' designs incorporate traditional Islamic features and local architectural styles, reflecting a blend of influences.

The Sarawak State Legislative Assembly building or Dewan Undangan Negeri (DUN) of Sarawak is one of the latest iconic building structures along the waterfront of the Sarawak River in Kuching, the capital city of Sarawak. The artwork by Dr. Valerie Anak Michael, Emil Elmariz Bin Johny, and Nathaniel Subil features the DUN building's architectural layout as a prominent nine-pointed star, symbolizing the unity of Sarawak's nine divisions. Drawing inspiration from the past, the building's roof design honours Sarawak's architectural and cultural traditions. Its intricate details reflect the unique blend of cultures that define Sarawak's heritage.

The evolution of building design in Sarawak illustrates a dynamic interplay between tradition and modernity. From the traditional longhouses and colonial influences to contemporary buildings, Sarawak's architectural future promises to honour its rich heritage while embracing innovation and environmental stewardship.

The Orang Ulu longhouse, elevated by 30 feet, is a remarkable architectural creation made exclusively from robust ironwood and *belian* wood. This structure is distinguished by its ornate paintings and sculptures that embellish the stilt poles, showcasing the community's artistic heritage. In an effort to depict the distinctiveness of Sarawak, the artist employs a mixed-media composition that emphasises the intricate motifs adorning these stilt poles. This artistic approach highlights the rich cultural heritage and unique architectural style of the Orang Ulu, capturing the essence of the tribal group's traditional craftsmanship and aesthetic sensibilities.


Title: Serita Tho Sabe

The Melanau dwelling, a water serpent, and a big jar that collects rainfall are the three primary elements of this artwork. To heighten its air of mystique, the serpent is shown in a hazy manner. Sketching methods that emphasisze a diversity of lines to generate form are employed extensively in this work. The use of mixed-media, including coloured pencils, acrylic, pen, and ink gives the artwork an extra dimension.
