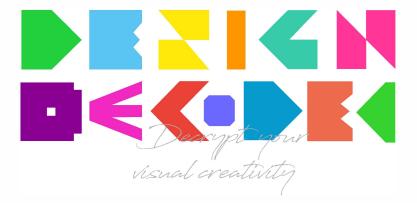

Onlookers

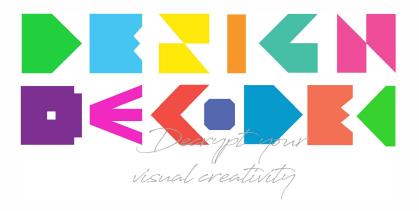
