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
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This is a book which offers ideas for many of us who are expected to conduct an oral presentation for various reasons such as a school project, college research or assignments, and a project or report at work. This could include research proposal, academic research/project, a postgraduate thesis, and other research reports which are academic as well as non-academic in nature such as those presented at the workplace. The book also outlines: the format/structure, content, and especially the delivery aspects of an oral presentation such as the use of language, non-verbal skills, the use of visual aids and the importance of feedback. In addition, it proposes a set of criteria used for the assessment of an oral presentation.

There are five chapters in this book.

- Chapter One details the preparations needed for the presentation of one's research.

- **Chapter Four** contains information on how to present the research; this is the chapter that focuses on what to say and how to say it.
