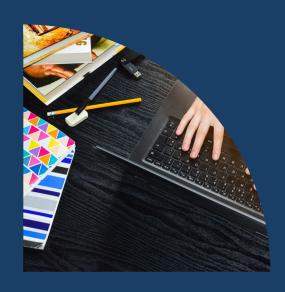

The primary concerns highlighted include the global pandemic, geopolitical conflicts, economic uncertainty, resource constraints, and political instability. These factors collectively underscore the intricate challenges that must be addressed to navigate the path toward achieving sustainable development on a global scale.

# **GLOBAL PANDEMIC**
