Tourist Attractions Spots

Traveling typically involves visiting interesting tourist attractions, shopping, tasting delicious food, and experiencing the culture. For interesting tourist spots, the Oriental Pearl Tower, the Bund, and Nanjing Road are must-visit locations in Shanghai.

The Oriental Pearl Tower is a versatile television and radio tower, standing at 468 meters tall. It is one of the tallest buildings in Asia. The tower offers various attractions, including an observation deck, restaurants, and a museum. Visitors can enjoy panoramic views of Shanghai, dine at the restaurants, and explore the city's history at the tower.

Accommodation and Transport

In Shanghai, budget accommodations that cater to travellers are quite affordable and comfortable. Hostels are widely available in the French Concession and Nanjing Road, offering dormitory-style rooms and communal spaces for socializing. These hostels often provide amenities like free Wi-Fi, laundry services, and tour bookings. For those seeking more privacy, travellers can also opt for guesthouses and budget hotels, which can be found throughout the city, particularly in districts like Jing'an and Xuhui.

For getting around, Shanghai's metro system is a cost-effective and efficient way to explore the city, with English signage and affordable fares. Public buses complement the metro and cover areas not reached by the metro. For short distances or a more local experience, bike-sharing services like Hellobike, Meituan and Qingju are popular and economical. Taxis are relatively inexpensive compared to many major cities, and ridesharing apps like Didi Chuxing offer competitive rates. However, most drivers only speak Chinese, so it is better to carry addresses written in Chinese to show to the taxi drivers. It is recommended to sign up for Alipay for making payments in Shanghai. Walking is also a pleasant option in pedestrian-friendly areas such as The Bund and People's Square.

Utilizing these budget-friendly accommodations and transport options allows travellers to experience Shanghai's culture and attractions without breaking the bank.
