INTRODUCING

Stepping into the Profession

The Pharmily Enrichment Programme (PITEP) 2026 titled **“The Persona of Young PRP”** was specially designed for all final-year pharmacy students (RX21) as they prepare to transition from undergraduate life into the professional world of pharmacy practice. Held on 14 June 2026, from 10:10 am to 11:40 am, the session served as a timely intervention, marking a pivotal “pejam celik” moment for the students who are just around the corner from completing their Bachelor of Pharmacy degree.

GOAL 1

Holistic student

The primary aim of this talk was to holistically prepare students—mentally, emotionally, and physically—for their upcoming roles as Provisionally Registered Pharmacists (PRP). It recognised that graduation is not merely an academic milestone, but the beginning of a demanding professional journey that requires clarity, resilience, and direction.



GOAL 2

Navigating Future Pharmacy Careers

One of the key focuses of this programme was to guide students in making informed decisions about their future career pathways. Participants were encouraged to reflect deeply on their preferred working sectors—whether in the public or private sector—and to explore various fields of pharmacy practice. These included hospital pharmacy, public health clinics, community pharmacy, the pharmaceutical company, academia, and research. Through structured guidance and sharing sessions, students were supported in identifying the career path that best aligns with their personal strengths, interests, values, and professional characteristics.

GOAL 3

INSIGHTS INTO THE WORKING WORLD

The programme also aimed to provide realistic exposure to the working world that awaits them after graduation. Students were briefed on the expectations, responsibilities, and challenges faced by PRPs in Malaysia's healthcare system. This includes understanding workplace dynamics, clinical responsibilities, patient care expectations, and the importance of professionalism in multidisciplinary teams.



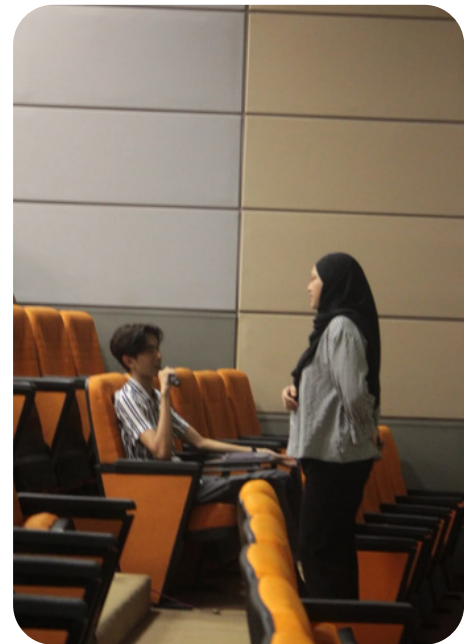

GOAL 4

Keys to PRP Success

In addition, the session emphasised the essential skills required to become a competent and outstanding PRP. These include communication skills, critical thinking, clinical decision-making, teamwork, time management, and emotional resilience. Students were also be guided on common pitfalls and the “don'ts” of being a PRP, helping them to avoid mistakes that may affect their performance and professional growth during their training period.

**GOAL 5**

Ready for Registration

A step-by-step briefing also be provided on the PRP and Fully Registered Pharmacists (FRP) application process, ensuring that students were well-informed and prepared for registration requirements, documentation, timelines, and regulatory procedures. This practical guidance aimed to reduce anxiety and ensure a smooth transition into pre-registration training.
