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## **ABSTRACT**

There has been a serious increase in the issue of juvenile offences in Malaysia. 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## CHAPTER ONE: INTRODUCTION

### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

#### From the article of The Star;

26 homes were broken into by two boys, who are both aged 7 and 8, in a 6-month thieving spree. Both boys stole money, shoes, caps, mobile phones, a watch and a portable console game. The boys bought shoes and a radio-controlled car with the stolen money.

As mentioned by Putrajaya OCPD Asst Comm Abdul Majid, the two boys attended the same school and lived within the same government staff quarters in phase 4C, section 8.

Homes of residents living within the same apartment block were broken into by the two boys. They used keys which they had found hidden in shoes and pots near the entrance.

As said by ACP Abdul Razak, some of the homes were not even locked, as it was a norm for homes in Putrajaya to not be locked as it is assumed to be a crime free city. ACP Abdul Razak also suspects that the boys found the idea of robbing houses easy due to the fact that one of the thieving boy's parents also hid their house keys in the shoe.

The boys were finally caught after proudly exposing their 6-month crime spree to a friend who then reported to his father. A police report was lodged by the friend's father on 27th October. Victims of the boys' thefts thought it was a small matter thus no reports were made. After the report was logged, police questioned the two boys at their homes where they admitted to the crimes.
