Course Description	This course exposes undergraduate students to self-directed learning through which they prepare their final semester, supervised academic exercise. Students have a choice of three forms: a critical essay concerned with textual analysis; a research paper that entails field research and empirical data; or, a project-based research proposal. Students choose any topics of their interest so as to conduct a small enquiry or mini investigation that makes an original, intellectual or creative contribution to the field. The course covers the step-by-step approaches to academic research and writing from presenting arguments to conducting research. Its general aim is to expand the student's intellectual faculties and capability for learning and problem solving. The course also provides students with the opportunity to design their own study plan.

Students will be expected to work out and adhere to a research plan and to consult their supervisor regularly about the progress of the exercise. 	Final Project	Students have a choice of three forms: critical essay, research paper or project-based research proposal, any of which should be written about 25-30 double-spaced pages (in the format of an academic journal article).	40%	CLO3		
	Seminar	Students are required to deliver a formal, oral presentation of their methodology and findings to examiners (among supervisors) and fellow students, which will take place at the end of semester, worth 30% of their final mark for this course. The Seminar Presentation should be about 15 minutes in length, followed by 10 minutes of discussion/answer-question session. The presentation is meant to be a dialogue between students and their research paper reading committee (supervisors). The Seminar Presentation should occur before the submission of the final draft.
